Within the context of significant enhancements being made to improve the Health Systems Evidence and Social Systems Evidence user experience, as well as the processes through which database content is continually developed and maintained, the ForumLab is offering an exciting job opportunity for McMaster undergraduate research assistants.

Research Assistants working in the ForumLab work directly with the Forum staff and faculty with the primary task of updating and maintaining our two free online databases <https://www.healthsystemsevidence.org/> and <https://www.socialsystemsevidence.org/> of pre-appraised, synthesized research evidence on how to strengthen or reform health systems or in how to get cost-effective programs, services and products to those who need them. These databases play a vital role in several aspects of the McMaster Health Forum's activities.

**Job Summary:**

Under direct supervision, provide support of a routine nature related to the collection and review of data for research projects while updating and maintaining HSE and SSE.

**Accountabilities:**

1. Input data into spreadsheets or databases and maintain information and records with high attention to detail.
2. Work individually and with a team to harvest relevant systematic reviews, assess reviews for methodological quality, and search relevant databases of publications for individual studies.
3. Conduct preliminary, basic analyses and prepare summaries of data.
4. Assist with obtaining data and information from databases for others to use in the development of presentations, scientific papers and reports.
5. Seek guidance and direction from researchers or other project staff.

**Qualifications:**

**Education:** Currently enrolled in a relevant undergraduate program at McMaster University. Prospective applicants must still be enrolled in a McMaster undergraduate program in September 2026.

**Experience:** Prior experience is not required.

- Evidence of ability to be flexible in approach to meet challenges in an innovative and pragmatic way;

- Comfortable working in a virtual environment.
